Message from Our First Selectman

There are three problems in Bridgewater that never seem to get resolved: Speeding, signs, and the weather. Let's take a look at these commonly heard complaints in ascending order.

First, the weather. One can complain about any season. It's easy to feel aggrieved, but individuals can't do much about it. It's always too hot in summer and getting hotter. Christmas isn't white enough, while winter is too long and icy. In any season the winds are knocking down trees, power lines and cables. The Town is doing something about the wind by more than tripling our tree budget this year and going after "problem trees" along with Eversource. Maybe we can start to catch up with the Emerald Ash Borer to take down dead trees and overhanging limbs before potential outage events. This process may become the constant "new normal."

A second problem is more than an annoyance and comes from beyond our town borders. It's the great polarity of political opinions that manifests itself in signs, flags and banners that can offend neighbors or visitors. I hope we could refrain from these provocative or profane expressions. With due respect, everyone is entitled to freedom of speech guaranteed by the First Amendment. As First Selectman, I'm the designated "Sign Officer." One enforceable guideline limits signs in residential areas to 4 sq. ft while another seemingly ignored section forbids roadside contractor signs. These will be pulled out when we see them. Apologies, but our roadsides are not ad spaces. More guidance can be found in the Sign Ordinance on the Town website under Selectmen/Informational Documents.

One thing we all can agree on is that SPEEDING is rampant on both the state and local roads. It's the number one complaint. We have solutions on the way. We have added one police officer recently and will sign up another within a couple of months. There will soon be more shifts and more tickets given as opposed to warnings. Bridgewater also just received a grant for two new LED radar signs. These can alert officers of rates and times when speeding occurs.

Our "ace in the hole" to suppress the speeders is to call in the CT State Police special unit to make unannounced visits and pull over everyone exceeding the posted limit on any road. So pay attention, and please SLOW DOWN or you could have a big fine to pay, or even hit a cow!

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Taxpayers who wish to file for Farm Land, Forest Land or Open Space under Public Act #490 must do so between September 1st and October 31, 2021. A Qualified Forester's Report must accompany the Forest Land application, so please apply early as the process does take a while.

Personal Property forms will be mailed early October. Personal property that is required to be claimed are any assets owned by October 1, 2021 and used for business purposes and unregistered motor vehicles. Examples of items used for a business are tools, office supplies, furniture and equipment (computers, fax, printers etc.). Unregistered Motor vehicles including campers, RV's, snowmobiles, trailers and cars registered in another state but garaged in Bridgewater for more than 90 days. Tractor and horses need to be claimed if used for business purposes only. The Personal property forms must be received by November 1, 2021.

Attention Veterans- If you have not filed your honorable discharge papers with the Town Clerk you must do so before September 30th to receive your tax benefit for next year. There are various tax programs available for Veterans'. If your income is below \$37, 600 if you are single or \$45,800 if married (not including Veteran benefits) you may qualify for an Additional Veteran's exemption. Also, if you were designated by the Veteran's Administration as disabled please bring your form in as you may qualify for a Disabled Veteran's benefit. These forms must be in our office before October 1, 2021.

The <u>Board of Assessment Appeals</u> will be meeting in September to hear disputes on motor vehicle assessments only. Please contact our office in August for applications.

<u>Totally Disabled and Certification of Blindness</u> must be filed with our office by October 1st 2021.

Region 12 Schools Tuition-In Program A Big Success



Region 12 Schools has been creative with its enrollment efforts over the last five years. These efforts have resulted in bringing more attention and additional students to the district and our towns. For the past three years, much focus and awareness have been placed on the success of our fledgling agriscience program. However, the success of the Region 12

Schools tuition-in program cannot be underestimated. The tuition-in program has brought numerous students from beyond the towns of Bridgewater, Roxbury, and Washington into our outstanding school system.

This quiet tuition-in program has offered educational opportunities for families that do not live in the towns but are willing to pay to have their students access our educational system at Booth Free School, Burnham School, Washington Primary School, and Shepaug Valley School. Tuition-in does not just benefit the students and families accessing our schools; it also benefits the communities by providing additional revenue back to the towns. Roxbury Selectwoman Barbara Henry shared, "Having the tuitioning-in students is a win-win for our outstanding school system. One, it benefits the students to have slightly larger class sizes which brings a more diverse interaction and learning experience, and, two, the monies garnered from those tuitioning-in students are returned to the towns from the school. It's an example of collaboration that has worked well in our small communities for years. Now that we have the agriscience program up and running, it is taking what has been done in the past to a higher level."

Educating students who choose to tuition-in does not cost the district additional dollars. All monies received from tuition-in students are returned to the towns. Region 12 Schools has seen a steady increase with tuition-in revenue over the past three years: 2017-18 resulted in \$351,744 to the towns, 2018-19 increased to \$615,491, and 2019-20 refunded \$925,686. Washington Selectman Jim Brinton spoke about the refund to the town of Washington, "Our town was very pleased to see this year's refund from Region 12. It shows solid fiscal responsibility and a continued partnership between our schools and the three towns that make up the Region."

Tuition-in seats are offered based on availability within the grade level and school. Seats offered do not take away from the educational opportunities of the students who are residents in our three towns. Our analogy is that we sell the empty seats on the plane, we do not buy a new plane. Region 12 Schools' educational quality is not compromised by accommodating tuition-in families; therefore, resources available and educational needs are taken into consideration during the application process. Selectman Curtis Read from Bridgewater credits the tuition-in experience for our children by saying, "The expression "the more, the merrier" certainly applies to our Region 12 Schools. To combat declining population and low birth rates, the Region needed more students to add capability and vibrancy to the student body. With the expanding tuition-in program all our schools have gone beyond survival to a thriving level of academic achievement with financial benefits returning to the towns. Every agriscience or student from neighboring towns comes with tuition funds that must, by law, be returned to Bridgewater, Roxbury, or Washington proportionally. More students equals more unexpected income. It's the definition of a win-win." Families seeking tuition-in opportunities complete an application and are interviewed with the building principal. Applications are reviewed by both the school and district.

The quiet tuition-in program has thrived mostly through word of mouth. The waitlist continues to grow as the demand to be part of Region 12 Schools increases. For the 2021-22 school year, Region 12 Schools has received 260 applications to be part of the tuition-in program. Hoping you all had a safe July 4 celebration. We certainly deserve it as we get closer to surviving COVID!

The Department of Veterans Affairs: The latest funding bill has the VA receiving nearly \$270 billion, including \$113.1 billion in discretionary spending and \$113.1 billion in advanced funding for veterans medical care for fiscal 2023. Much of the \$170 million increase would go to health care services, including \$73 million added to the \$778.5 million request for women's health and \$1 million above the \$13. 2 billion request for mental health services. The bill also would fully fund the VA's construction projects, assistance programs for an estimated 37,200 homeless veterans and rural health initiatives.

A working group of dedicated advocates from The Military Coalition - a consortium of organizations representing a combined 5.5 million members - is making progress on concurrent receipt legislation and needs your help with a summer surge. Please ask your lawmakers to support the Major Riohard Star Act. Maj. Richard Star, USAR, namesake of the Major Richard Star Act (H.R. 1282/S.344), lost his fight with cancer in February of this year. Before the pandemic hit in 2020, he was tenacious - even with terminal lung cancer, he would struggle down the halls of congressional office buildings, stopping to catch his breath, to make it to the next office to advocate for concurrent receipt. For more information Check out this Star Act Tracker from Senior Master Sgt. Jeremy Kitzhaber, USAF (Ret), a dedicated volunteer advocate for the Veterans of Foreign Wars. With turmoil over delayed budgets and work on the National Defense Authorization Act, it is impactful to email and call your elected officials asking them to support the Star Act. You can call your lawmaker via MOAA's toll-free Capitol Switchboard at 1-866-272-6622.

For those collecting pensions, your monthly electronic Retiree Account Statement (eRAS) is now available on myPay at https://mypay.dfas.mil. While you're logged in to your account, please also take a few moments to verify that all of your contact information is correct. The key to receiving your military retired pay and other important information in a timely and efficient manner is to make sure that both your mailing address and email address on file are up to date. If you are a new retiree, it may be 30-60 days before your eRAS is available in myPay.

The DoD budget (\$715 billion) released by the White House last month includes \$228 million for Arlington National Cemetery (ANC), a \$146 million year-over-year increase thanks in large part to \$141 million in support of ANC's southern expansion. The Military Coalition (TMC) - a group of military and veterans service organizations representing a combined 5.5 million-plus membership - support this expansion and appreciate the ongoing capacity concerns of ANC officials. Please take action to preserve the future rights of our Veterans.

<u>Hiring Platform for Veterans:</u> Bridge My Return (BMR) can help you leverage your military skills in the job market. The free hiring platform connects you with employers and provides the tools and coaching necessary for private-sector success.

<u>Take VA's White Ribbon Pledge</u>: White Ribbon VA is a national call to action to eliminate sexual harassment, sexual assault, and domestic violence across VA. Everyone can help by pledging to never commit, condone, or remain silent about all forms of violence. Please join your fellow Veterans and VA employees across the country and take the White Ribbon VA pledge. DoD announced the further extension of certain expired retiree and dependent identification cards in a June 7 news release. The previous extension was scheduled to end June 30. Now, all ID cards with expiration dates between Jan. 1, 2020, and July 31, 2021, will be extended as described below:

- Through Aug. 31, 2021, for all Foreign Affiliates and their dependents.
- Through Oct. 31, 2021, for active duty dependents, as well as Reserve and Guard servicemembers and their dependents.
- Through Jan. 31, 2022, for retirees, their dependents, and all other Uniformed Services ID (USID) beneficiaries.

After fifteen months of adapting to distance learning, LVG's tutors and adult learners are slowly and safely returning to on location and in-person tutoring sessions in a variety of ways that suit each learning team. LVG's mission remains steadfast - to offer free English language literacy to adult learners in northern Fairfield and Litchfield counties, as they strive to become independent readers, writers, listeners, and speakers of English, enabling their full participation in the communities we share. We thank our many dedicated Bridgewater tutors who continue to give so freely of their time!

Our adult students continually look for ways to balance family and job responsibilities, while attempting to improve their English language skills and hone basic reading and math skills. 

Historical Society News

LOVERS' LEAP

The land we know as "Lovers' Leap State Park has a long and storied history. The 140 acres dedicated on June 16, 2007 was occupied for over 8,000 years by Native American tribes. Shad and salmon were the reason for its popularity, offering a plentiful food source prior to the damming of the waterway for the creation of Lake Lillinonah in the 50s.

Chief Waramaug was a famous leader for many years. His daughter, Princess Lillinonah, was the basis of the legend of two lovers who died in the waters of the lake. Great changes also came from the incorporation of Bridgewater in 1856, leaving the mother town of New Milford. Then called "The Neck", our Bridgewater was a subset of New Milford. As such, it lacked local government, taxation or decision making powers.

Once the Weantinocks left the land, it became home to the Hurd family. Their connection to Bridgewater was through the Judson family, one of the founding families of our town. The last of their line was Catherine Judson Hurd. This lady broke the mold. Orphaned at 15, she lived in "The Castle," the family home on the lake. Once she finished schooling, she became an actress, working with Bob Hope and Cole Porter among others. She wintered in the family apartment in New York City, enjoying



the arts and theater. She summered in the Castle and invited many of the rich and famous to visit. One of the buildings on the property was made into a tea house, called the "Yellow Cat Tea House." When she died in March of 1971, she left her estate to the State of Connecticut for a "public park." The Castle was destroyed by fire in 1988. The Tea room was destroyed by fire in 1995. While her history is all but forgotten, the land she gave to the public lives on. From The Desk of the Town Historian

With Covid came a shift in population from New York City to Connecticut. For many years, this has been the place to go to escape the crowds and intrusive press. When you live in Connecticut, your privacy is respected. Our town's history can claim many famous celebrities. Writers like Theodore White lived here for many years. Nobel award winners like Van Wyck Brooks and his poetess wife, Gladys,and celebrity Norman Mailer were residents. Artists Lina Hartwell and Grace Mead Wellwood found their inspiration here. The man responsible for the passage of the Pure Food and Drug Act of 1906, Harvey W. Wiley lived in a home on Skyline Ridge Road. Actress Mia Farrow calls Bridgewater "home," as have noted producers and directors. Scholars who taught at Trinity College and Columbia, like the Babbitt brothers called Bridgewater home. Others of note have enjoyed "Our Town." Part of the reason is that, when you live here, you're a part of our community, putting celebrity aside. Who knows who the next famous person will be?

Message From The Director

This past May, the Connecticut State Library (CSL) was awarded \$2,775,000 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) with \$2 million earmarked for direct grants to Connecticut's 165 eligible principal public libraries. To achieve ARPA's purposes, IMLS established high priority spending categories?for the ARPA Grants to CT Public Libraries program which includes digital connectivity, pandemic-related needs, and accessibility.

Here at the Burnham Library, ARPA Grant funds are supporting reopening efforts for our community by providing a clean and safe environment, creating comfortable and private seating and study spaces, and offering a reliable and effective public wireless network.

IMLS sees the outcome of the ARPA funding as the logical extension of the rapid and intentional rollout of the CARES Act of 2020 as well as Governor Ned Lamont's Everybody Learns Initiative which helped address digital inequities. Libraries empower their communities. As public libraries receive support to safely refresh spaces and equipment, expand programming possibilities, and increase services, we are growing library access for all.

Our goal is to not just provide an institution rooted in the traditional trappings of libraries but to create a place for gathering, conversation, and community. As we navigate this "new" normal, these grant funds are vital for us to continue to engage with our community in a creative and safe environment.

Bridgewater EMS Update

Do you know how to contact EMS when you need help? Call 911! Recently we have had people call the Fire House or individual members of the Fire Department looking for help. It may seem that this approach is more appropriate for a call that you do not think deserves a 911 response. But if you do not call 911 the delivery of the help you are seeking will likely be delayed. Delays can cause serious complications for people in need of Emergency Medical assistance. EMTs and Firefighters in Bridgewater are volunteers. We are not usually present at the Fire House. If you call the Firehouse you will probably get voicemail. If you call 911 our members will be promptly alerted by the 911 dispatcher. Bridgewater pays Litchfield County Dispatch for 24/7 dispatch services that notify us when we are needed. Our volunteers wear pagers so that Dispatch can reach us wherever we are. When our pagers are activated we all receive the alert at the same time. This allows us to respond most efficiently. If you call the Fire House, a Fire Department member, or some other person instead of 911, you will most likely cause unnecessary delays in our response. It is also possible that equipment we require to help you will be delayed. Please call 911 when you need our help. Do not hesitate.

Our volunteers often respond to 911 calls in personal vehicles. When the volunteers are responding they activate blue flashing lights on their vehicles. Whenever you are operating your vehicle and see you are being approached by a vehicle with blue flashing lights please pull off to the right side of the road and bring your vehicle to a stop. Allow us to pass you. Your courtesy will help us respond safely and in a timely manner. We appreciate your cooperation. Your neighbors who need our prompt assistance will also be grateful.

I am happy to tell you that we have another new Bridgewater EMT! Alison Parker joined us in July. She is an impressive and dependable young woman. At the completion of her most recent semester at Fordham University she also completed the work necessary to become a Certified EMT in New York. As soon as she reached that goal she contacted me and asked if she could volunteer as a Bridgewater EMT. Unlike New York, our state requires students to pass the challenging National Registry Examination for EMTs before it will grant certification. When I explained this to Alison she promptly registered for the test and successfully passed

the exam. She also completed the application process to obtain her CT Certification. She was accepted as a new member of our Fire Department and is now responding to EMS calls in our town. We are very happy that she has joined us. She is a good example of the kind of people that make Bridgewater such a special place. Please join me and the other members of the BVFD Emergency Medical Services team in welcoming Alison. We are grateful for her dedication and hard work.

We have a very good team of volunteers who provide Emergency Medical Services to our neighbors in Bridgewater. We are always in need of additional volunteers. If you have an interest in joining us I would like to speak with you. Please contact me using the email address below.


S. Eugenia Canfield

A few months ago, a strange black & white photograph came across my desk that had me perplexed. It shows two men, standing with their horses in front of a handsome gable-front home. There are some scribbles on the photo, but none of it meant much to me, except for the fact that it was allegedly in Bridgewater. What was suspect, was that the date of the picture (or so I guessed) was written in pencil: "1867-1871." The following line appeared to say "E. Schraeders," and then in pen, but in the same handwriting: "Bridgewater, CT." The first mystery was easy to figure out. Where did this come from? People know that we always consider items to include in our historical collection, so they drop things off to show us. It was a simple task to figure out that a friend of the library had left it knowing that I love all things Bridgewater history.

I shelved the picture as a nice gesture. I reached out to the patron and friend who dropped it off and went on my way for the next few months, with the handsome photo of someone else's family on my desk. This was about the same time that I started a project to document all of the people who have worked at Burnham as head librarian and director. I went into the files of Burnham Library, pulled out whatever pertinent reports I could find, and also re-read a history of the Library that Burton Canfield wrote at the dedication of the Burnham Library. Canfield had 22 years to retell, as the library, a separate nonprofit, had been housed at the Town Hall from 1904-1926 before it moved into its handsome stone building.

Canfield retold the early days of the library, focusing on those who worked to make the organization possible. It's nice to see other names highlighted. Surely Captain William Dickson Burnham deserves accolades, but his money would only get the organization so far without the hard work of oft-forgotten individuals. One of these individuals was Mrs. Burton Canfield, or Eugenia Canfield, as I soon found out. One of the shelves in the library is dedicated to S. Eugenia Canfield: First Librarian. It's amazing how important pieces of information can be sitting, waiting for context. I began my research. It turned out that S. Eugenia Canfield was the first wife of Burton Canfield, a prominent and philanthropic Bridgewater resident. S. Eugenia Canfield, or Sarah Eugenia Canfield was born on September 28th, 1866 (coincidentally, my Birthday 120 years early) in Bridgewater to Arza and Sarah Morris. Arza was active in St. Mark's church and owned a significant amount of stock in a hat factory across the road from his home. The factory has since been moved across the street, behind the house.

The picture? Where does it fit in? The picture I later realized, was labeled as the Mary Morris House. Mary was Eugenia's sister who was the last in the line of Amos Morris (the original owner of the property) to own the Morris homestead. This is the house that Eugenia grew up in, the home where she developed her love of books, and her passion for the community. In the end, this seemingly unconnected photograph meant more to the library than we thought. Sometimes it seems that context arrives when we aren't looking for it,



especially when doing research. Eugenia would have been young when this photograph was taken, but Arza and Sarah certainly were living there, planning their lives. If I hadn't spent the time to consider this photograph, then an early artifact of the home of our first librarian would have been lost.

The photo of the Mary Morris House and more artifacts and information about the history of Burnham Library and Bridgewater are available during normal business hours. Birthday gifts for the assistant director are accepted anytime.


