Message from Our First Selectman

Bridgewater is on a roll of late with lots of good news in the public sphere.

In August, the Yankee Institute ranked Bridgewater 1st among CT's 169 Towns for financial stability! The study cited how we keep operating costs low, have no pension liabilities and only \$27,030 in long-term debt (Region 12 Schools). Also, we have not had any rise in property taxes for five years.

On September 23rd the Sunday New York Times Real Estate Section featured a very favorable article on why Bridgewater is a great place to live with "natural beauty to spare." In early October the Danbury News Times also featured the town and Bistro in an extensive and positive piece. Maybe we are no longer the best kept secret in Litchfield County.

On the local front, the Bridgewater Mobil gas station, Deli, and Convenience Store has fully recovered. Route 133 has been renovated and repaved. We now have a new Resident State Trooper, Matt Bell, to manage our town police officers and keep a sharp eye and advanced radar on speeders.

Burnham School is thriving, as is our ACE program, providing both before and after hours care and enrichment for students. Megan Bennett has taken over as the new Region 12 Superintendent and is a welcome change for our school system as it begins building the Agriscience STEM Academy.

Just as the weather isn't always sunshine, I have to report that the Grange continues to be a dark cloud for the town. The State Historic Preservation Office and the CT Attorney General's office have prevailed upon us to halt our preferred demolition/rebuild option in order to explore if there is a "prudent and feasible" way to renovate the existing structure. The intervention is standard practice in a historic district on the National Registry when some level of local support for renovation is demonstrated. This process will delay any progress on resolving the Grange conundrum and result in more Town expenses. Unfortunately, our insurance company is now requiring that a chain link construction fence be erected around the condemned structure to avoid liability claims should it collapse in the near future. This improbable Grange saga has been unwinding since 2014 with more chapters likely to follow. It is hard to predict an outcome, but we will keep our residents informed when choices and financial implications become clearer.

Overall, Bridgewater is doing well as we approach the holidays and the New Year. We have weathered the tornadoes of May, the heat and rains of summer, the bears eating garbage, and the Kavanaugh hearings. We should put all that aside and be thankful for the young Christmas tree on the Green and our many other blessings.

Office of the Tax Collector

Taxes Due: The second installment of Real Estate and Personal Property taxes is due January 1. 2019. Bills were mailed in June; NO BILLS WILL BE SENT FOR THIS INSTALLMENT. For Real Estate bills, please notify our office if the payer has changed since July. If a different bank will be paying the installment or if you will be paying the installment instead of a bank, please call or send us a note with the new information. If you purchased property after June and did not receive the bill at the closing, please contact the office and we will send a copy.

Supplemental Motor Vehicle Tax Bills: These bills are for new or replacement vehicles registered after October 1, 2017 and before September 30, 2018. The bills will be mailed in December and become due January 1, 2019.

Online Services: You may now look up and pay your bills online, and can complete your own tax payment history reports for any time period. Searches may be made by name, property location, or bill number.

Payment: Payments must be received or postmarked no later than FEBRUARY 1, 2019 to avoid an interest penalty. Failure to receive a tax bill does not invalidate the tax or interest.

PLEASE NOTE: If you use an online banking service, there is no actual postmark on the envelope and your payment may arrive after the due date. The effective date will be the date your payment is received in this office!

Credit Cards: The Tax Department can receive payments made by credit or debit cards. There is an additional fee paid directly to the service provider to use this service. The amount of the fee is 2. 75% of the amount of the payment subject to a \$2.00 minimum fee. This service can be accessed through our website at www.bridgewatertownhall.org.

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Personal Property

All individuals owning and operating a business in the Town of Bridgewater, including businesses that are being operated from home, are required by law to declare furniture, fixtures, tools, equipment, etc. for taxation purposes. Owners of unregistered motor vehicles or vehicles registered out of state that are here six months and one day need to apply.

Personal Property forms have been mailed out and must be returned in our office by Thursday, November 1st. If forms are not returned or returned late there will be a 25% penalty on the value of a business owner's personal property.

Farm Machinery, Horses or Ponies

The application for an exemption on all farm machinery, except motor vehicles as defined in Section 14-1, up to the value of \$100,000, ponies, horses which are actually and exclusively used in farming, within the provisions of Section 12-91 of the General Statutes must be filed annually by November 1st.

Applications to claim personal property and farm machinery, horses or ponies are available on the Town's website www. bridgewatertownhall.org or in the Assessor's office.

FROM THE HISTORIAN'S DESK

The Town lost a good friend last month when Pat St. John passed away. A longtime resident, she was a fixture at Town meetings, the Tractor Parade, the Fair, and many political gatherings, accompanied by her husband, Alli Lake, and their pugs. She was a Renaissance woman.

Born Patricia Unger in Brooklyn, New York on September 20, 1945, as an infant she developed a severe infection. Fearing she might die, the doctor administered what was an overdose of antibiotic which caused severe damage to her eyes. She underwent several eye operations which were only partially successful, leaving her with a lifelong loss of vision and double vision, which she corrected through exercises. Pat attended local public schools and then went on to Erasmus High before her family moved to their summer home on Candlewood Lake year round. She then attended Danbury High and went on to Trinity and then Kentucky Wesleyan College for both her BA and Master's degrees. There she developed her love of writing and teaching.

Following an early marriage to Bob St. John, she moved to Bridgewater with her son, Chris, in 1977 and taught English and French at Derby High School. They divorced in 1988. She developed an interest in Spiritualism and the paranormal. This led to her interest in communications in all animals. Eventually, she wrote The Secret Language of Dolphins. She worked with both captive and wild dolphins in the Bahamas. From her research for this book, she segued to aspects of communication in autistic children, studying non-verbal communication in group homes. She married Alli Lake in 1990, and they founded a non-profit, MIDPOINT Research Foundation for Creative Communication. When I met Pat in 1993, she was one of the early users of EBAY. As a consignor, she attended auctions, yard sales and second hand stores searching for "treasures" to list on EBAY. That was at a time when that name was not part of everyone's vocabulary. She eventually narrowed her purchases to Meissen and fine porcelain, becoming an expert in identification and age of the pieces.

One of Pat and Alli's interests was the Renaissance Faire in Tuxedo, New York. They dressed their parts and interacted with the players there on summer and fall afternoons. The aspect of fantasy appealed to both of them. This love of fantasy influenced Pat's writing. At the time of her death, she was almost finished with her latest work of fiction, as well as a memoir called "72", her age at the time of her death. She wrote about her return to teaching, this time at Shepaug High School. Hopefully, both books will be published posthumously.

A memorial service will be held at the Bridgewater Congregational Church. Her obituary can be viewed at DanburyMemorial.com under their "Remembrances" column. Her ashes will be scattered off Cape Cod.

She will be missed.



FY 2019 NDAA: On Monday, Aug. 13, the FY 2019 John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) was signed into law. Once the Congress completes the defense appropriations legislation, the measure will fund the policy directives and authorizations. This is one of the largest NDAAs signed in history and will provide significant funding to improve all services based on current forecasted needs!

<u>VA Appropriations</u>: Among a series of spending measures last week was the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) appropriations. The VA will receive its full budget for FY 2019 and partial advance funding for FY 2020 to assure continuity of veterans' health and disability, education, survivors, memorial and other benefit payments between fiscal years.

The appropriations bill is the VA's largest spending bill in history, providing more than \$197 billion for health and benefits programs-over \$86 billion in discretionary (mostly medical-related programs) and over \$110 billion in mandatory benefit payments. Visit eBenefits.va.gov for the entire bill or log into MOAA.ORG for a synopsis of salient points.

<u>VA Mission Act</u>: In an effort to streamline and improve access to health care, veterans service organizations rallied behind the VA MISSION Act to get the bill signed into law, making it easier for veterans to get care when and where they need it - whether within the walls of the VA health system or in their community. VA has until June 2019 to fully implement the new program and consolidate all seven VA community care programs, including the current Choice Program, into one simple and easy to access program. Log into the VA's Community Care website to keep informed.

<u>COLA (Cost of Living Adjustment)</u>: With the fiscal year coming to a close, we will soon know the final Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) for retired pay and social security benefits. The current prediction for the final COLA is 2.8 percent or roughly \$28 for every \$1,000 of retired pay you receive.

<u>Share the Veterans Crisis Line Number to Save a Life:</u> September is Suicide Prevention Month - which is the perfect time to share a life-saving resource: the Veterans Crisis Line. This confidential, toll-free, 24-hour-a-day hotline serves Veterans and their loved ones year-round. Reach qualified, caring responders

<u>Survivors Pension Benefit</u>: Sometimes referred to as Death Pension, is a tax-free monetary benefit payable to a low-income, un-remarried surviving spouse and/or unmarried child(ren) of a deceased Veteran with wartime service.

TRICARE Retiree Dental Program (TRDP) & Vision Program: Now called the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program (FEDVIP), this program will begin sometime in October. That's when military retirees will be able to begin to review online the various features and monthly premiums of dental plan options and vision options for replacing their current program set to expire after Dec. 31. Log on to eBenefits.va.gov to learn more about this major benefit!!!

Rest & Recreation (R&R): Servicemembers, retirees and their families who are planning a year-end getaway can land major discounts to Universal Orlando Resort, thanks to a new offer announced last month. Discounted four-day adult passes for two of the resort's parks, Universal Studios-Orlando and Islands of Adventure, will cost about the same as a single-day admission for regular resort customers. The tickets must be purchased at information, tickets and travel offices, or at leisure travel offices, at participating installations; get a state-by-state list of participants at https://site.universalorlando.com/military/.



As The Bridgewater Scholarship Committee completes its 46th year of activity, it would be appropriate to reflect on its greater good to the community. It all began at a town meeting in March 1972 and was initially funded \$50,000 by the Harris Fund and Captain Burnham Fund. All gifts since have been private as well. We are allowed to distribute only the earnings of these funds to our applicants. That currently amounts to just over \$40,000 per year.

All full time residents of Bridgewater are eligible to apply. All who complete the process receive a check at the end of July prior to the academic year. While the need of these students is far greater than the awards we are able to offer, our students are grateful for the scholarship fund's assistance.

Recently, Dorothy Gustafson willed the Fund \$250,000 in memory of her parents Grover and Evandinia Allen. This gift along with other gifts over the past halfcentury, allows us to honor these people while helping the youngest among us.

THE HISTORY OF TAPS

We have all heard the iconic strains of TAPS, but do you know the history?

It all began during the Civil War battle at Harrison's Landing. After the battle, a Union officer was still on the field after nightfall. It was very dark and Captain Elliscombe heard the moans of a wounded trooper. In the darkness, the officer could not tell if the soldier was Union or Confederate. Being a humane man, he put the soldier over his shoulder and carried him to his battalion hospital tent. As he struggled with the young man, he thought of his son who had gone south to study music before the war broke out. He had not heard from his son. Arriving at the surgeon's lighted tent, the officer discovered his burden was dead and that it was his son who had been conscripted into the Confederate forces. The officer requested a full military funeral for his son with the regimental band playing. This was all denied. One coronet player from the band offered to play the notes of music jotted on a piece of paper inside the dead son's pocket. It is said this is the first time that TAPS was ever played. We have heard these notes many times since.

"Go to sleep. Go to sleep. All is well. All is well. God is nigh, God is nigh. Sleep thee well."

And that is the history of TAPS. Well...not exactly. This story originated with Ripley's Believe it or Not and this is definitely a "Not." The story's greatest error is that there is no record of a Captain Elliscombe having served in the Army of the Potomac. There is, however, one bit of truth in this story as is true of most historic myths - TAPS was written at Harrison's Landing after the Seven Days Battles of 1862. The musical notes were originally written as the call for lights out, not funeral music. At that time, the call for lights out was a French tune called "Extinguish Lights" that Union General Daniel Butterfield felt was too formal. He wanted something more calming to tell his men the day was over. He turned to an old tune called "Scott's Tattoo." The term tattoo back then had nothing to do with body ink, but was derived from an Old Dutch military word meaning is was time to turn of the beer taps and return to camp. A Tattoo was usually played about an hour before lights out. General Butterfield thought this Tattoo and a newer one used by the Union Army were a good starting point for a new tune. He called on his bugler, Oliver Wilcox Norton, and the two worked together to compose the new tune. Here is Norton's account of that meeting:

"One day, soon after the seven day's battles on the Peninsular, when the Army of the Potomac was lying in camp at Harrison's Landing, Gen. Daniel Butterfield sent for me, and showing me some notes on a staff written in pencil on the back of an envelope, asked me to sound them on my bugle. I did this several times, playing the music as written. He changed it somewhat, lengthening some notes and shortening others, but retaining the melody as he first gave it to me. After getting it to his satisfaction, he directed me to sound that call for "Taps" thereafter in place of the regulation call. The music was beautiful on that still summer night and was heard far beyond the limits of our Brigade. The next day I was visited by several buglers from neighboring brigades, asking for copies of the music, which I gladly furnished. I think no general order was issued from army headquarters authorizing the substitution of this for the regulation call, but as each brigade commander exercised his own discretion in such minor matters, the call was gradually taken up through the Army of the Potomac."

The new call for lights out spread among both the Union and Confederate Armies, and within a few months it was played for the first time at a military funeral for a Union cannoneer killed in action. Captain Tidball choose the tune because he thought a bugle call would be safer than the traditional rifle shots over a soldier's grave. He didn't want the enemy to consider the rifle shots an attack. General Butterfield's bugle call was officially called "Extinguish Lights" in American military manuals until 1891. Since then, TAPS has become a formal part of U.S. military funerals. The name TAPS most likely came from the three drum beats that were played at the conclusion of the lights out call. The drum "taps" became TAPS, and the name of the new tune. And now you know the real history of this well-known mainstay of military funerals.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

Become a Volunteer with Bridgewater's Ambulance



You can help to fill an important need in your town by volunteering your time with the Bridgewater Volunteer Fire Department's ambulance, providing basic emergency medical care and transportation.

You don't need a medical background or any experience. We offer the training necessary to be certified. Classes require a significant amount of time but the rewards are immeasurable.

Our ambulance is staffed by both emergency medical responders (EMR) and emergency medical technicians (EMT). The biggest difference between the two is the training and the scope of practice (what they are allowed to do). EMR's require a minimum of 60 hours of training and EMTs are required to have a minimum of 150 hours of training. Both include written and practical examinations.

The scope of practice for EMRs and EMTs reflects the amount of training for each. In general, both can provide management of airways, CPR (cardio pulmonary resuscitation), AEDs (automatic external defibrillation), burn and wound care, and ves - childbirth! EMRs are limited in the use of some diagnostic tools and administration of medications, among other things.

Tuition is covered for those who make a commitment to serve on Bridgewater's ambulance.



The Bridgewater Land Trust has been preserving and protecting open space and farmland in Bridgewater for the past quarter-century. This year has been marked with great success as new partnerships have resulted in more public access, improved farm facilities and a new focus on property monitoring and maintenance. Many of these partnerships have provided funding and knowledge that has helped us protect and enhance our properties.

A few examples:

- A grant from the Connecticut Community Foundation allowed us to blaze a public trail off of Town Line Road. In the future we hope to partner with our neighbors The Roxbury Land Trust to continue work on this trail - a wonderful prospect for hikers.
- The Connecticut Department of Agriculture granted us funding to repair the Town Line Preserve barn and matching funds for 6,900 feet of new fences.
- We have enlisted help from the Weantinogue Heritage Land Trust who is providing monitoring services for all of our properties. This important work was funded by the Ellen Knowles Harcourt Foundation.

The BWLT is very proud of what we have accomplished this year, especially the opening of our first trail on Town Line Road. We enjoyed celebrating that opening with you at the Fun on the Farm Day and Harvest Dinner in September. We also honored Board Member Bud Wright's permanent protection of Comanche Hill Farm - 34 acres on Stuart Road East.

Your continued support is critically important to the work we do in Bridgewater. The Bridgewater Land Trust is YOUR land trust. Thank you and enjoy the beauty of the season!

Stuart Family Farm Operating at Sunny Valley in Bridgewater

Protecting nature. Preserving life."

Sometimes, a fresh start means returning home. Bridgewater farmer Bill Stuart Jr. and his family found their new beginning when they returned to the area to operate the family farm where Stuart spent his childhood. Things aren't all the same; that's the way he wanted it.

"We wanted to have a sustainable farm of 100 percent grass-fed beef. So, we're doing strictly grazing and haymaking at all the fields. There's no corn, no use of herbicides or pesticides."

Stuart's plan worked well with what The Nature Conservancy determined was the best use of his parcel of Sunny Valley Preserve. In western Connecticut's hills, planting row crops could increase the chances of erosion. By using a rotational grazing method, the cattle are fed with minimal impacts on the land while helping sustain the ecosystem.

A graduate of the University of Connecticut's (UConn) College of Agriculture, Stuart began his career in commercial farming in Pennsylvania before continuing in the meat business in Massachusetts. While at UConn, he earned the opportunity to complete an international internship in Germany, where he mostly worked with pigs. His research and quality testing methods were unique.

"We were on the cutting edge of measuring quality traits and then having the farmers come in for feedback," Stuart said. "They could change their methods to produce the highest quality pork possible."

His eye for quality is reflected in all of Stuart's operations and often mentioned by patrons of the farm store open every weekend. Those conversations also reinforce his connection to the community of Bridgewater: one he describes as hard-working, passionate about open space and friendly towards agriculture. These are all attributes his upbringing taught him to value.

"We love interaction with the new people that we meet along the way, and as the business continues to grow, we're just looking forward to continuing to feed people in the area."

An affinity for the community of Bridgewater, resilience, and a sense of curiosity that motivates him to continue finding new ways to be even more sustainable are all traits that define Stuart.

"My wife and I are fortunate that we're able to do what we do. It's kind of fulfilling a dream on our end, and we wouldn't be able to do it without The Nature Conservancy and the local land trust (Bridgewater Land Trust). It was kind of a perfect situation for us to come into."

UPDATES AND REMINDERS

from the Health District

It's a busy time of year, thinking about holidays, school breaks, weather...but there's something else the Newtown Health District wants you to think about - your health!

Cold and Flu season will be coming along - please be mindful - Influenza (the Flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. Please be careful and take precautions.

This past year, Flu got a lot of media coverage. There were many questions about the effectiveness of the Flu shot, the timing of the flu shot and there were many respiratory illnesses in addition to the flu going around. The flu shot is one very important step you can take to help stay healthy and not get the flu. It may not be 100% effective, but any protection is important.

In addition to getting a flu shot, good health habits are another excellent way to help protect against the flu.

- 1. Avoid close contact Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from also getting sick.
- 2. Stay home when you are sick If possible, stay home from work, school, and errands when you are sick. You will help prevent others from catching your illness.
- 3. Cover your mouth and nose Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. It may prevent those around you from getting sick.
- 4. Clean your hands Washing your hands often will help protect you from germs.
- 5. Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.
- 6. Stay healthy/get healthy: Do everything you can to improve your health. The healthier you are the more resistant your body is to disease. Adopting healthy behaviors such as getting plenty of sleep, being physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, eating nutritious food and avoiding tobacco can prevent or reduce the damage done by many illnesses, including influenza.

That # 6 is a good one to work on all of the time. It will help you with many potential health issues (high blood pressure, diabetes, overweight, depression, stress). Be good to yourself and take care of your body.




