Message from Our First Selectman

It's always a bit unsettling to turn over a new decade and enter the future, especially as trends beyond Bridgewater start to affect our old ways. In this letter, I'm looking ahead at changes on the near horizon.

For instance: 5G is here. Not really, but it's coming soon. Some see this as a new golden age of tech, connected devices and the "internet of everything". It will be so fast that you can download a movie in mere seconds! Experts also say that young people will want to move to your town if it is 5G enabled. If not, your town will be left in the trash heap of history.

The 5G downside will be felt soon - maybe this year. Cell providers need many more towers and micro towers/antennas on phone poles at about every 1/3 mile. The high band frequencies don't carry far or penetrate obstacles well. Maybe Bridgewater will escape the initial roll-out push by the carriers which is already happening downstate. The problem is that the towers/antennas are somewhat ugly. They need their own power supply which is about as large as a coffin and may have to be pole mounted if there is ledge underground. Our Planning & Zoning Commission only has a short time to write new regulations to control the aesthetics of 5G infrastructure.

Another hot topic before our local governments is the advent of electric cars and trucks. Will we become responsible for constructing charging stations and providing free power for EV charges? The answer appears to be: "No" for practical and expense reasons. It is estimated that within five years 30% of new cars will be electric. The improvements in range, battery charging times, locations, standard designs and user software are all being worked out on the fly with competition from many players. It's the next big thing.

Electric vehicles should help air pollution and operate at significant efficiencies over traditional fossil fuel vehicles. The state may mandate that the towns have dedicated EV parking spaces to encourage the trend, but it is unlikely Bridgewater will have a charging station on the Green anytime soon. You will most likely be "filling up" at home overnight.

The Town hopes to install a solar array this summer on the Town Garage roof. We recently qualified for CT/Eversource incentives that make a large installation affordable. The "green" power generated by up to 76 solar panels will offset the kW generation costs for the town garage and possibly a portion of other town meters, if allowed by the utility.

Lastly, in thinking about the future and the new decade, Bridgewater needs to be proactive. Within the next couple of months we plan to send out a brochure announcing the "Fund for the Future of Bridgewater". This will be a non-profit entity designed to receive tax deductible donations for our institutions and initiatives that will strengthen our community. Please pay attention to this when it comes to your mailbox.

LAST DAY TO PAY WITHOUT PENALTY FEBRUARY 3, 2020

Payment must be RECEIVED or U.S. POSTMARKED by February 3, 2020 for the Supplemental Motor Vehicle taxes and the second installment of the Real Estate and Personal Property taxes. If taxes are unpaid by that date, the interest penalty in February will be 3% with a \$2 minimum. Failure to receive a tax bill does not invalidate the tax or interest.

PREVIOUSLY DELINQUENT bills accumulate additional interest when not paid by the last day of the month.

If you use online banking for your payments, please do not wait until the last minute. Checks processed in this manner often DO NOT have a US postmark and will be credited on the RECEIVED date.

DOING YOUR STATE/FEDERAL TAXES? Payment history reports can be generated via the town's website. Please visit the Tax Collector's page at www.bridgewater-ct.gov and follow directions carefully.

DMV News: Get out of line by going online! Visit the DMV website at www.ct.gov/dmv. Check the status of your license and registration; check property tax, insurance, emissions and other compliance issues; pay infractions online; cancel or renew registrations, and more.

If the address on your motor vehicle bill is wrong, it is your responsibility to change it with the Department of Motor Vehicles. Our office cannot change the DMV record. A lot of effort is wasted on redirecting bills that are sent to the wrong town year after year.

PAYMENTS: The Tax Department can receive online payments made by credit card and e-check. There is an additional fee paid directly to the service provider to use this service. E-check payments cost an additional \$2 for the entire amount (payments may be combined). The fee for credit card payment is 2.75% of the amount of the payment, subject to a \$2.00 minimum fee. Online payment can be accessed through our website at www.bridgewater-ct.gov

From The Desk of the Town Historian

You can't find "Goodyear Island" on a map. Not now, anyway. Going back to the mid 1600s, it was a much used trading post in what is now Lake Lillinonah. It was located in what was known as the "neutral territory", so Native Americans and settlers both felt safe to canoe out and barter their goods. In more modern times, it became a recreational place for Bridgewater and New Milford residents to go for a day of sun and fun. When the plan was made for the formation of Lake Lillinonah, Goodyear Island was considered to be a navigational menace. The many trees were cut down. Buildings were demolished. The ground was razed. That was the end of Goodyear



Islands except for the memories of those still living and the beautiful landscape painting done by W. H. Hilliard, who as one of the Hudson Valley School of painting, painted its portrait in 1875.

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Homeowners, who were 65 or older or totally disabled on or before December 31, 2019 and are full-time residents, may be eligible for tax relief. To qualify for the State benefit, your income must be no more than \$37,000 if unmarried and \$45,100 if married, including Social Security. For the Local benefit your income must be \$16,000 or under, not including Social Security. Applications must be received by May 15th, 2020.

If you rent and are 65 or older or are a surviving spouse or totally disabled on or before December 31, 2019 and are full-time residents, you may be eligible for tax relief. To qualify for the State Renters program your income must be no more than \$37,000 if unmarried and \$45,100 if married. including social security. The application period is April 1st to October 1st, 2020.

If you are a Veteran or surviving spouse of a Veteran and would like to apply for benefits, you must file your proof of honorable discharge with the Town Clerk's office by September 30, 2020 to receive your benefit on the bill you receive in June. 2021.

If you are a Veteran or surviving spouse and your income is between \$37,000 if single or \$45,100 if married (not including your Veteran's disability payments) you may qualify for an Additional Veteran's Exemption.

If you are a V.A. designated Disabled Veteran you may qualify for other programs. Please speak to the Assessor about the various Veteran's programs.

We appreciate your service and want to be sure you are receiving the full benefit to which you are entitled. If you know of a resident of Bridgewater who is an Active-Duty Serviceman or woman with a motor vehicle registered in Bridgewater, please contact our office, as they may qualify for a total tax exemption of their vehicle.

Applications for the various programs listed above are available on line at our town web site bridgewatertownhall.org or in our Assessor's office.



VETERAN'S NEWS



2020 National Defense Authorization Act: Benefits include:

Pay raise: 3.1%!!!

- Repeal of Widows Tax (Survivor Benefit Plan-Dependency and Indemnity Compensation offset, commonly called the widows tax): This major win has been "in the works" for years but only recently passed objections in the House and Senate. This was a major injustice deducting a significant monthly amount from a deceased veteran's life insurance if there were any VA payments earned by the veteran called Dependency Indemnity Compensation (DIC) as a result of their death on active duty. This amount could be a monthly deduction of almost \$1000. It will be phased in over 3 years.
- Expanded Commissary/Post Exchange Benefits: Starting Jan. 1, 2020, access will expand to include all veterans with service-connected disabilities, veterans who are Purple Heart recipients, veterans who are former prisoners of war, and individuals approved and designated as the primary family caregivers of eligible veterans under the Department of Veterans Affairs Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers. The Department of Defense is expanding commissary, military exchange, and morale, welfare, and recreation (MWR) retail privileges on U.S. military installations as specified in the Purple Heart and Disabled Veterans Equal Access Act of 2018, included in the John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2019. <u>NEW VA Mobile App:</u> Now Veterans (including Afghanistan & Iraq War Vets) can learn about their toxic exposure risks with new VA App. Just log into VA.gov and look for VAMobile app. Through the app, users can find studies into the exposure, learn how to apply for benefits and connect with certain VA programs, like the "Agent Orange Registry Health Exam for Veterans." Region District 12 Updates

Bridgewater students are thriving in Region 12 Schools.

Our students are experiencing lessons in and out of the classrooms at Burnham School and Shepaug Valley School. Students are able to learn from the new agriscience courses at the high school level, enrichment opportunities through clubs at the middle school level, and from multiage classrooms at the elementary level. The dynamic learning occurs through rich discussion and specially designed lessons that allow the students to empathize, hypothesize, and analyze the world around them.

Students at Burnham School have been learning about cultures in their backyard to across the globe. Our Grade 3-5 students learned about the indigenous cultures of North America. They explored how the Native American culture thrived and continues to impact our lives today. All of the students learned about Poland from the Cultures Around the World annual celebration.

Shepaug Valley School students have been using the STEM learning platform to win recognition from Samsung Solve for Tomorrow's State Competition. Robotics Coach Sheila Gambino and her students are finalists in the competition. Our agriscience teacher, Peter Lawler, is working with students to build a self-driving tractor merging technology and engineering with agricultural innovation.

Our students are also showcased in academic competitions. Our mathletes are traveling throughout the state solving complex math problems and our debate team has been contemplating challenging global issues as they deliver convincing arguments against opposing teams. The World Affairs Forum will take the global debate and awareness to the public this spring.

The official ribbon-cutting ceremony for the agriscience program at Shepaug Valley School will take place in April 2020. We hope that all members of the community will come out to celebrate the new program and the completion of the building project.

How many times have you heard (or said), "There's nothing to do" - or, worse, "I'm bored"? Terrible words. In the time before television or the internet, entertainment was in the eye of the beholder. If you confessed to being bored, some frustrated parent would be glad to point you in the direction of the sink full of dishes or the wood pile that could use replenishing. The wise child didn't make his boredom known.

So, what was there to do? In nice weather, you could count on catching some fish. "Shad" were plentiful then, although they have gone to friendlier waters now. Swimming was always popular on warm summer days. If you were lucky, you could take a horse down to the river's edge. Children hunted for small game. Tree houses were built. Hop Scotch and running games were popular. Young ladies learned how to sew. Some painted landscapes or drew portraits from memory. Music was a very popular pastime. As children grew into young adults, music had the added benefit of being a way to earn extra money. Small bands were hired at dances and parties. One group from Bridgewater had musicians who played violins, cello, flute, French horn and piano. Impressive.

By far, the two most popular entertainments were dances and musical performances. But where? Have you ever noticed the window to the right of the Town Hall front door? That was where the entrance fee was collected. Once paid, the audience would take the stairs to the second floor. If it was a concert. chairs would be lined in rows in front of the stage (yes, that's a stage) and if it were a dance, the band would be up on the stage and chairs would line the walls.

The Grange was another popular organization who hosted dances and "theatricals", as well as picnics. Since most families were members of the Grange, the size of those picnics was extensive. Odds were, if you didn't meet your future mate at a Grange function, you met at school. School plays were very

popular and the chorus was always well attended.

So, the next time you hear someone complain about the band width, their battery charge or just boredom in general, smile sweetly, think of some odd job you loathe and take them by the hand.

Meet George and Jane Pratt

Burnham Library and Bridgewater Land Trust were pleased to celebrate the silent responsibility of George and Jane Pratt on November 23rd. The following is part of the sketch of the Pratts who preserved over 1,145 acres in Bridgewater including the Recreation Center, the land where the town garage is located, the Jane Pratt Preserve on Town Line Road and large open space parcels preserved by Sunny Valley.

George Pratt and Jane Abbott were married in 1923. While I've been largely unable to ascertain how they met, one person that knew them said to me, "people who lived the sort of lives that the Abbotts and the Pratts did, floated within the same circles." In fact, if one does a little bit of cursory digging, one can find the families attending the same events at the turn of the century. But who were they individually?

Jane Abbott was born in Montclair, New Jersey in 1904. She was the daughter of the philanthropic lawyer, Henry Hurlbut Abbott. As a teenager, Jane attended the Brearley School, a prestigious all-girls school, but it was at Bryn Mawr that Jane found a love of philosophy and language. Jane finally settled at Columbia where she graduated with a degree in philosophy and comparative religions.

A disciple of Jung, Abbott worked on publications of the Analytical Psychology club to which she brought her interest in psychology, mythology, and symbolism. She later became founder and editor for the journal: Spring: An annual of Analytical Psychology and Jungian thought.

After moving to Bridgewater in 1925, Jane became involved in local preservation, education and politics. When she died in 1990, she was fondly remembered as a patron of the town and a conservationist. While George was more public in his activities, Jane was a powerhouse in her own right, not just in her preservation efforts, but in her significant contributions to Jungian psychology, politics and social justice.

Not too far from Jane, but a few years' prior, George Dupont Pratt was born in 1898 in Brooklyn, New York. George was educated at Harvard and during the WWI served in the American Field Service (AFS) with the French Army. The AFS were a group of volunteers who paid for their own uniforms, travel costs, and then were paid the same low wages as locals. They transported soldiers and injured men in and out of the front lines. It was an incredibly dangerous job that someone in George's social standing was under no obligation to take, exemplifying the silent responsibility that we are focusing on.

George was a man of many interests. According to Jane, he often regretted not specializing in one thing, but she couched this with the statement that this was why he was so successful. After the War, although he accepted a position working at the American Embassy in Rome, he never took it. By the end of the twenties he left the city and the many philanthropic organizations he belonged to, to come to this little town. Following his noted rebellious nature (George was a democrat, his parents were not. George became a farmer, his parents were decidedly not.) George and Jane betrayed their upbringing and moved into a small, humble cabin of which they would never move out of.

Pratt feared the loss of farms, agriculture and woodlands. George would turn to nature for peace and refreshment. He didn't even like people who spoke in the woods. According to Jane, he would complain about people who "lived in nature without being of it."

Their characteristics were broad, impactful. They were also contradictory. Jane Pratt said it best when she remembered a luncheon of dairy farmers she and her husband attended. They..."...all drank milk and

sang doggerel set to popular tunes in praise of cream-top bottles. That lunch was certainly a far cry from the embassy that my husband never went to in Rome!" They had, in many ways betrayed their past and we have all reaped the rewards through the preservation of a significant portion of this town and the many projects they were patrons of.



Bridgewater EMS Update February, March, April 2020

On behalf of The Bridgewater Fire Department I want to wish all of you a Happy New Year. We hope your 2020 is off to a great start and that the new decade will prove to be a time of good health and good fortune for everyone in our Town.

The Flu Season has officially arrived in Connecticut. The CDC recommends that everyone 6 months of age and older should get a flu vaccine every season. There are rare exceptions to this rule. The Flu Vaccination has important benefits. It can reduce flu illnesses, doctor visits, and missed work and school due to flu. It can also prevent flurelated hospitalizations. These benefits are not just for the more mature among us. Flu vaccine has been shown to be life-saving in children. In fact, a 2017 CDC study showed that flu vaccination can significantly reduce a child's risk of dying from flu. It is not too late to receive your vaccination if you have not already done so. Please ask your primary care physician for advice and guidance.

This time of the year the weather can affect both your need for Emergency Medical Services and our ability to provide you with the assistance you require. Medical emergencies may be related to health conditions but they can also occur as a result of weather related incidents. Snow removal is a frequent cause of overexertion. Slips and falls from ice and snow often cause an increase in injuries during this time of year. Poor driving conditions lead to an increase in Motor Vehicle Accidents. Please use caution when you are out and about. As always, however, please know that if you need assistance from the Bridgewater Emergency Medical Technicians we are prepared to respond to your 911 call.

It is a very good idea to take a few simple precautions to prepare for the possibility that you might require our assistance at your home. Your house number should be clearly visible from the road both during the day and night. Please make sure that there is a pathway cleared and available that we can use to gain access to you. If you need us to respond at night please turn on your exterior lights if possible. Finally, please make a list of your medications, allergies, and your medical conditions. This list should be kept updated and

presented to our EMTs when they ask for it. The availability of this list can save precious time when it is needed the most.

As you know, the Bridgewater Fire Department and our Bridgewater Emergency Medical Services team are made up of volunteers. We need additional volunteers to help us continue to serve our neighbors. If you are a retired person seeking a meaningful way to spend some of your golden years, volunteering with us is a wonderful opportunity. If you are home either during the day or during the night and you can be available to provide some help when needed, please come join us. Young people who are interested in community service and gaining experience that can lead to exciting and rewarding career and leadership opportunities are encouraged to come see what opportunities we have for you. Large dumpsters will be at the town garage located at 324 Hut Hill Road, where residents may drop off bulky household items to be disposed of from Monday, April 20th through Saturday April 25th.

One free pickup truck load or two carloads per household. Additional pickup loads will cost \$25 per load. 1-3 ton truckloads will cost \$50 per additional load, with a maximum of 3 total loads per household.

All articles that are too large to transport to the Town Garage in your own vehicle may be placed on the roadside for pick-up BY 7:30 A.M. MONDAY, April 27th. Roadside pick-up will be on MONDAY ONLY!! If you put anything out after pickup is completed, it will be your responsibility to remove it.

WHAT NOT TO BRING!!!

- HAZARDOUS WASTE (paint, solvents, pesticides, etc.)
- CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS
- HOUSEHOLD GARBAGE State Law prohibits the town from accepting garbage at the Town Garage.

The following items are accepted year round at the Town Garage; please do not put these things out for pick-up, although you may bring them to the Garage.

Glass Recycling Program



The HRRA is implementing a new glass recycling program approved by CT DEEP. Bridgewater will begin to collect glass separate from the mixed recycling stream beginning in June 2020. While it's convenient for residents to mix recyclables in the same bin, the sorting process for mixed recycling isn't perfect. Machines and employees at the MRF cannot remove all the contamination

One of the biggest contaminates is broken glass particles. The pieces of glass attach themselves to paper, cardboard, and other recyclables contaminating the bails and reducing their market value. The glass itself that is sorted is contaminated with bits and pieces of other items such as small pieces of paper, bottle caps, metal, and straws reducing its value. Most MRF glass is sent to landfills as Alternate Daily Cover (ADC) and is never recycled into a new product. Please take the time to read about the glass recycling program at www.hrra.org/glass-recycling. All residents will be required to recycle their glass separate from the mixed stream.

IMPORTANT to note: Glass is a designated recyclable by state law. Glass should not be disposed of in the trash. Learn more about the State of Connecticut's recycling laws by visiting www.ct.gov/deep


