Message from Our First Selectman

Some infrastructure projects should be coming to fruition in our fair town over the next six months. A small sunken garden between St. Mark's and Bistro Bridgewater is slated for late season work. It will commemorate the Bridgewater Grange #153 structure.

You might not notice the garden, however, if you drive too fast through town, because our police vehicles will soon have two-way radar and automatic ticket printers in the cabs to catch more speeders. This will also be handy for a surprise crackdown at the 4-way stop in the heart of town. My advice is to please slow down all over town.

Our largest undertaking will be Burnham Library construction with the help of a \$232,000 reimbursement from CT Small Town Economic Assistance Program (STEAP). The building will be getting a new slate roof and a modern elevator. These jobs require complex structural upgrades to meet current codes. The total job should cost about \$500,000 to make this iconic landmark ready to celebrate its centennial in 2026.

Many people watched while the new Captain's House, also known as the "Burnham Cottage" on the National Registry, was going up contiguous to its third location since 1850. Captain Burnham's will directed funds to build both a library and a school along Main Street. His legacy is being recognized anew by replicating original design elements of his earliest home with historic and newly milled local woods. It's not a coincidence that both homes of W.D. Burnham's youth face each other directly across South Main Street.

Captain Burnham's gifts to Bridgewater were because of his idyllic and formative boyhood here. If you are curious about local history and believe in its significance for Bridgewater's present, please stop by and visit this new addition to our historic center after the town's Memorial Day parade and program on the Green.

Here is what was said at the July 14, 1919 meeting of the Marine Society of the City of New York:

"That in Capt. Burnham's passing there has departed one of the most remarkable men in our maritime affairs...of great executive ability, a true judge of human character, he built up under the American flag the largest freight line of the US. He was a strict disciplinarian, honorable in all his dealings; he despised all crooked ways, he was simple and democratic in his tastes, with no care for outside show; he was a true friend, a strong, honest, determined, and sturdy man, whose place it will be hard to fill among us."

DEMAND NOTICES for all overdue taxes were sent in March.

INTENT TO LIEN NOTICES were sent in April for Real Estate taxes which were overdue. In May, liens will be placed on the Town's land records for all delinquent real estate accounts.

JULY BILLING - Bills for Real Estate, Personal Property, and Motor Vehicle taxes will be mailed in June and become due on July 1, 2024. These bills are for property assessed on the 2023 Grand List in October 2023. Payments must be received or postmarked by August 1st 2024 to avoid an interest penalty. Failure to receive a tax bill does not invalidate the tax or interest. Please notify the office of any changes to your mailing address.

If your Real Estate taxes are escrowed, the bank should request your Real Estate bill. If you change banks or pay off your mortgage, please contact the office to let us know where the bill should be sent.

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Tax bill season will be upon us shortly for real estate, motor vehicle, and business personal property.

In review of your motor vehicle tax bill, you may notice your assessment may be different from previous years. The Assessor's office is responsible for valuing motor vehicles, on an annual basis, in accordance with Connecticut General Statute Section 12-71d. All motor vehicles valued in Bridgewater have been valued as such for the 2023 Grand List. By following the state statutes, it ensures that all property is valued in a fair and equitable manner.

Bridgewater Dog Owners Must License Their Dogs in June

Dog owners must license their dogs 6 months and older at the Town Clerk's office beginning June 1 st.

Licenses also may be obtained through the mail by sending a <u>self-addressed.stamped envelope</u> with a check or money order and the following information: owner's name, phone number, address, dog's name, breed, age, color markings, and sex. The address of the Town Clerk's Office is **P.O. Box 216**, **Bridgewater**, **Connecticut 06752**.

The state requires all dogs to have rabies vaccinations, so a certificate of the current shot is required. If licensing a dog for the first time, bring the spayed or neutered certificate to qualify for a lower license fee.

Dog owners have until the end of June to license their dog without penalty. There is a \$1.00 per month penalty for dogs not licensed in June. See form below. Please detach form and mail in with all required documentation.

Bridgewater LOVES Dogs!

All dogs over the age of <u>6 months</u> are required per State Statute to have a current rabies vaccination and be licensed by June 30th every year. Beginning July 1st, a penalty of \$1.00 is charged for each month the dog is unlicensed.

Travel with Military Discounts: Traveling this summer to Disney Resorts, Hershey Park and similar destinations could be less expensive by visiting Military.com and taking advantage of the discount programs offered by private industry to honor our veterans.

VA Aims to Emphasize Free Burial Benefits for Veterans at National Cemeteries: Log on to VA. GOV and download the many free benefits for military veterans. Veterans can also file a "pre-need application" for free burial and save their loved ones the sometimes challenging process of determining their rights as a veteran for free burial, head markers, etc. Planning ahead is really helpful since many families don't worry about required documents until there is an event.

Lawsuit Settlement: A \$6 billion settlement in a series of lawsuits over allegations that earplugs sold to the military by manufacturing giant 3M during the height of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars caused hearing damage will move forward after nearly 250,000 veterans and service members agreed to accept the deal, the company announced this week. The settlement agreement is being managed by litigation management firm BrownGreer, which has set up a website for claimants to track the settlement at www.combatarmssettlement.com.

TRICARE Users Can Refill Prescriptions With MHS Genesis Health Record System: A great benefit to retirees as TRICARE moves to modernize its prescriptions pharmacy benefit. Log in to VA. GOV and see how to take advantage of this new items.

Tricare for Life (TFL): If you receive the benefits of healthcare retirement through TFL, please keep in touch with what DOD and Congress will be looking at to increase costs. Please join a military retirement program like Disabled Veterans of America, Military Officers Association of America (MOAA), America Legion or the like to keep in touch. If you don't use it, you'll lose it!

Stay Tuned!: A bipartisan Senate bill introduced March 6 would strengthen employment and health care benefits offered to eligible caregivers, and could make it easier for these providers to save for retirement and better prepare for their financial future. If you qualify as a caregiver of a seriously wounded, ill, and injured veterans, Congress may direct the VA to pay the stipend, which was



considered "unearned income," directly to the caregiver rather than the veteran. This act is called the Veteran Caregiver Reeducation, Reemployment, and Retirement Act, and may have significant impact on how caregivers are paid and how it impacts taxes. More to come!

SCHOOL news



The solar eclipse brought science and astronomy to life for students, and encouraged teachers and administrators to make use of what educators often refer to as a "teachable moment." The eclipse inspired teachers from across our district to focus on the celestial phenomenon with their students. We provided every student with ISO approved solar eclipse glasses so they could view the experience safely, both at school and home. Although a few districts decided to enact an early-dismissal schedule, we believed that the experience was an important one and something teachers and students could enjoy witnessing collectively.

Students at Burnham School, accompanied their teachers outside to view the eclipse ahead of their normal bus pick up time. Prior to the eclipse, staff and administration shared relevant resources that highlighted information, as well as important safety tips. Friso Hermans, physics and astronomy teacher at Shepaug Valley School, prepared relevant online videos and resources for students and staff across the district, highlighting the science of an eclipse and precautionary measures to follow.

The last month has also been busy as students have demonstrated their knowledge and skill through project-based learning. On March 13th, students at Burnham held their annual Invention Convention. This event was truly inspiring as students displayed inventions they designed to solve problems faced by everyday people. One student created a quick and efficient pizza wrapper for single slices to stay fresh. Another Burnham student designed homemade organic makeup. The products demonstrated students' creativity, critical thinking and ingenuity!

At Shepaug Valley School, the play Matilda, which was held from April 5-7, was a resounding success. Community feedback was extremely positive, and many comments praised the production for its "stand out" performances. Just prior to the opening of the production, elementary students at Burnham School and from across the district traveled to Shepaug as a field trip to view a condensed version of the play. Needless to say, students thoroughly enjoyed the experience of seeing a famous children's book by Roald Dahl come to life on stage.

On April 10th, I had an opportunity to answer questions about the budget during Burnham's PTO meeting. We discussed details relevant to budget requests, including new security measures (e.g., armed security



With spring in full swing, the Bridgewater Land Trust is busy with property improvements, trail clearing and opportunities for residents to enjoy the great outdoors. Grant Received for The Lamont Preserve

The Bridgewater Land Trust was recently awarded a grant in the amount of \$9,250 by the Ellen Knowles Harcourt Foundation based in New Milford. This grant will be dedicated to improvements at the Land Trust's newly acquired Lamont Preserve which is located along Northrup Street with additional frontage along Lake Lillinonah. The targeted improvements include a preserve sign, property clean up and clearing, and the creation of a new trail for the public to enjoy. The Bridgewater Land Trust received the 45 acre Preserve thanks to the generosity of Governor Ned Lamont and his wife Annie Lamont who owned the property since 2005. Support from the Ellen Knowles Harcourt Foundation and other generous donors will allow us to move forward with needed improvements.



We are also in the process of finalizing a permanent conservation easement on a 28 acre parcel with very high conservation value. More details coming soon. Our new 5K course will be finalized this summer. We are looking forward to hosting walkers, hikers, ioggers and trail runners on this exciting and challenging off road course.

Thanks to all volunteers who helped us clean the roadsides of Bridgewater during the town wide cleanup day. Our volunteers are critical and we deeply appreciate the skills and energy that are so frequently offered.



Bridgewater EMS Update

Someone asked me the other day, "What does it take to become an EMT" (Emergency Medical Technician)? After I had explained to them, I thought, I should explain the requirements to whomever else may not know what it takes.

For starters, you must be at least 16 years old. You will need to complete an OEMS approved EMT training program in Connecticut with a minimum of 150 hours of class time, which includes written and practical examinations. Once your 150 hours is complete, you then need to successfully pass the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technician cognitive exam as well as successfully pass the Connecticut OEMS approved psychomotor exam.

Once you become a certified EMT, you will need to complete 40 hours of continuing education plus a skills verification every two years to maintain your EMT certification.

Knowing these requirements, one might ask, "Why should I become an EMT?" Well, I can't answer for everyone, for everyone has their own story, their own ambitions, but I can tell you what being a volunteer EMT means to me.

You Can Make a Difference!

Every single day you may have an opportunity to help people, change lives and often, save lives. Whether you bandage up someone after a car accident or help pick someone up from the floor that has fallen, you're in the center of people's life-changing moments. Your presence, skills, and knowledge directly bring positive change.


